



The Beeches Independent Special School – Prevent Action Plan

The Beeches Independent Special School recognises that it has a duty under Section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act, 2015, in the exercise of its functions, to have due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism

The Act is founded on a set of common principles that state specified authorities must:

1. Assess **risk** of radicalisation in their area / organisation
2. Develop an **action** plan to reduce this risk
3. Train staff to **recognise** radicalisation and extremism
4. Work in **partnership** with others
5. Establish **referral** mechanisms and refer people to Channel Panel
6. Maintain records and reports to show **compliance**
